



## Botley C of E Primary School PE and Sport Premium Funding Document September 2022

At Botley C of E Primary School we use the additional funding provided through the PE and Sports Premium to meet the Department of Education's stated expectation that we will make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport that we offer. We will ensure that we continue our outstanding provision of PE and sport and further build upon our extremely strong infrastructure and provision to ensure that the children receive a wealth of sporting opportunities and a high quality Physical Education.

We ensure that we measure our achievement against the five key indicators:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity - the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school.
2. The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement.
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.
5. Increased participation in competitive sport.

During the 2021 - 2022 academic the school receive additional funding of £19,890 for PE and School sport with an additional carry forward from the previous year (due to Covid) of £6,100, making a total of £26,551 (rounded to £26,600) available for the academic year. There was a clear instruction from the Department for Education that all PE Premium funding, including carry forwards should be spent by the end of July 2022. The table below shows the school's plan for 2021-22 and the impact of this investment.

Additionally, under a new SGO some events that were previously undertaken did not during that year.

In response to this and in order to maximise participation figures, several 'Botley hosted' Key Stage 1 events were proposed for the 2019/2020 school year and were supported by the PE and School Sport Premium.

\*\* As is to be expected there was a significant impact of Covid restrictions which meant that the school was closed to most children from March 2020.
