SPRING TERM HAPPENINGS ...

Chichester visit

As a part of their Coach Potato theme, Year 5/6 visited the Sports department at the University of Chichester in early January. The trip, which focused on the importance of healthy lifestyles, was led by Senior Lecturer Dave Eldridge and involved groups of children working on activities from fitness testing to small sided games.



In a recent email, the University praised the '*attitude, enthusiasm and behaviour*' of our children and commended them as a '*credit to your school and staff*'. As a school, we can look forward to continuing our relationship with the University of Chichester and use it as a platform to provide more unique opportunities for our children.





Playground remarking

The February half term saw our weather playground receive a much needed facelift as, due to the generosity of FOBS, we had the playground remarked. 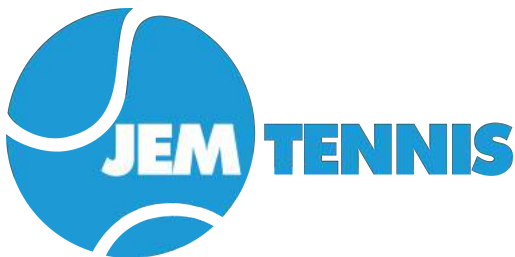

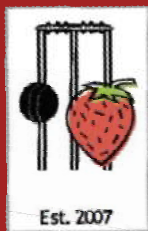

PE questionnaire 2017/2018 - parents

Responses

20 replies received

Question 1: What is your opinion regarding the quality of PE provision in our school?

The general response was incredibly positive with the only uncertainty coming from a Reception parent who felt their experience was too brief to comment. Whilst this survey has definitely brought to light some key issues to address, it is reassuring that the overriding consensus towards the provision of sport and PE at our school is one of positivity and satisfaction.

Question 2: How do you feel the current provision for PE in school could be improved?

A mixed array of responses were listed, the key and recurring points are listed below:

- 2 parents commented that the provision was great/brilliant with another praising the opportunities provided
- 1 parent suggested bringing in sport specific professionals to support delivery alongside Mr Rowles
- 2 parents enquired as to community club links to enable a pathway from which children could build upon sporting experiences at school
- 1 parent requested more gymnastics apparatus to further enhance the teaching in this area
- 1 parent thought a greater range of alternative sports could be included within the curriculum
- 3 parents commented on the selection process towards sporting teams, with 1 suggesting more time be afforded to those selected to prepare for events

Question 3: Are you happy with our before and after-school sports club provision?

All bar one, response was positive towards our before and after school club provision. The one negative response felt that provision was very poor, especially when it came to club cancellation. Whilst every effort is made to ensure clubs are not cancelled, this is unfortunately inevitable from time to time as inclement weather means outdoor activity is not possible. In such an event, we do seek to use indoor spaces but, due to a full club schedule, this is not always possible. For example, on a Thursday when Cross Country club is held, we have TPA (Performing Arts) in the hall.

Some suggestions of clubs to add were as follows: Tag Rugby, Netball, Swimming, and Ballet.
There was also a wish for more girls clubs and increased provision and opportunity for children in Year R.

Question 4: How would you like to be kept informed about PE and sport activities in the school?

Whilst the overriding response was positive with many praising the PE newsletter, some parents expressed a desire for messages to be sent via text as well as email, especially with regards to competitions and up-coming trials for squads.

One parent suggested having a sport specific noticeboard at the front of the school with another expressing wishes for a sport assembly once a week.

Question 5: What is your opinion of our school Sports Day?

This question brought about a mixed response, especially when it came to the Key Stage 2 Sports Day.

The consensus towards Reception and Key Stage 1 was incredibly positive with recurring comments such as 'well organised', 'great fun', 'very good', 'fantastic', 'love it' coming up. One parent suggested continuing the pre sports day picnic theme that Reception have in Key Stage 1.

Results were somewhat mixed with Key Stage 2. Whilst many said they enjoyed it, some felt that there was too much waiting around for activities, with parts feeling a bit disorganised. The competitive nature received a mixed reply with some parents feeling it was not competitive enough, whilst others expressed feelings of it being too competitive with child groups for events needing addressing. The traditional 'Parents' race' also came into question with some not keen on it.

Any other comments or points relating to school PE and sport:

Some suggestions were made, which we will be looking into, these include:

Possibility of HIIT (High Intensity Interval Training) for children / Personal Best challenges

Not limiting numbers on clubs during National School Sport Week

Mini Wimbledon competition

Introducing non-standard sports to the PE curriculum

Making the process of passing on information with regards to accomplishments and achievements easier

Several parents commented on how privileged they felt to have a school with such emphasis on sport and PE, with one saying that their children 'love PE at school'

PE questionnaire 2017/2018 - pupils

Responses

27 replies received

Question 1: Do you enjoy your PE lessons?

With 93% of surveys indicating that children enjoy PE some/all the time, it is with some certainty that we can say the culture within our school towards PE is very positive; with only 2 responses (7%) where children expressed they did not enjoy PE (one from Key Stage 1 and one from Key Stage 2).

Question 2: Do you feel that your PE lessons are improving you?

Whilst over half the responses (55%) indicating that children felt PE was improving them (with only 1 feeling it was not), a large percentage (41%) were unsure.

Question 3: Do you currently attend an after or before school club?

7 responses (26%) indicated that children did not attend a club at school with 20 (74%) indicating that they did. Those engaged in clubs attended a wide variety, ranging from Cross Country to Football, Gymnastics to Karate.

If not, please state the reasons why? (e.g. Time, cost, etc)

Of those not attending clubs, the feedback was mainly that they did not attend due to commitments outside of school. One parent commented that their child does not attend a club because Netball no longer runs for Year 5/6.

Question 4: Are there any clubs that you would like to take part in at our school that we currently do not have?

Whilst many responses said no towards this question, the suggestions that came out were:

Basketball / Swimming / Tag Rugby / Netball - separate club for Year 3/4 and Year 5/6 / Athletics

Question 5: Do you attend any sporting activity out of school? (e.g. Swimming, ballet, horse-riding, taekwondo, etc)

The response to this message indicated that children were incredibly active outside of school, with only 1 reply saying they did not attend a club. A diverse mix of clubs was listed, ranging from Martial Arts to Trampolining, Swimming and Gymnastics proving the most popular.

Question 6: Have you ever represented Botley Primary School in an inter-school team event (against other schools)?

9 children (33%) said they had not represented Botley at inter-school level with 18 children (67%) saying they had.

Question 7: Please write a short sentence about how you feel about PE at our school.

Several comments were noted here. Many said PE was fun and they enjoy their lessons with Mr Rowles. Some said they wanted to do more PE each week, with one asking to do it everyday.

Key suggestions:

- 1 child asked about the selection process for sporting events
- 1 wanted the opportunity to change elsewhere - separate area for boys/girls
- 1 wanted an increased level of challenge for outdoor games
- 1 requested more gymnastics apparatus to enhance provision

Summary of findings and actionable points

Across the board, the general consensus appears to be that of positivity by the majority towards sport and PE at Botley Primary School. As a result of this questionnaire, the following actionable points have been put into place:
